Information

- This guide is intended for students applying for co-op work permit from inside Canada.
- A co-op work permit is needed when your academic program includes a co-op, internship, placement or work-integrated learning experience as part of your curriculum.
- If work is integral to your program of study, you are required to have a co-op work permit before you start your work-integrated learning component. Your co-op work permit will list “Seneca” as your employer; this work permit still allows you to work for external employers. Your co-op work permit is only valid for the mandatory duration to fulfill your approved co-op requirements.
- When applying for the initial study permit, if you have a work-integrated Learning component in your program, please apply for your co-op work permit at the same time. IRCC may issue both study permit and co-op work permit to you when you enter Canada.
- If you did not apply for a co-op work permit overseas or have not been issued a co-op work permit, you have the option to apply for it online from inside Canada.
- Please note a co-op work permit cannot be issued longer than the duration of your study permit. If your study permit expires prior to the completion of your co-op term or program, you will need to apply for a co-op work permit at the same time you apply to extend your study permit. Eligibility

- You have a valid study permit.
- You are required to work in order to complete your study program in Canada.
- You have a letter from your school that confirms all students in your program need to complete work placements to get their degree.
- Your co-op placement or internship totals 50% or less of your study program.

When to apply

- Start your application for a co-op work permit as soon as you receive an official letter confirming that the work is required for your program of study. Examples are a Letter of Acceptance or a Co-op Letter acknowledging that you are required to do the work-integrated learning component as part of your program at Seneca.

Cost

- Free
- \$85 - some applicants may need to pay biometrics fee (check if you need to give biometrics on this [website](#))

Required documents

- **Application to Change Conditions, Extend my Stay or Remain in Canada as a Worker (IMM5710)**
- **Co-op letter** – Please request this letter from your [Work-Integrated Learning Coordinator](#). For programs that do not have a WIL coordinator, please connect with your program coordinator.
- **Proof of identity** – e.g., passport or travel document. Please provide a copy of the bio-data page (the page with your name, date of birth, passport number, expiration date, etc.) and a copy of every page of your passport that has stamps, visas, or markings from any country. If you did not use a passport to enter Canada, please provide copy of your travel or identity document.
- **A copy of your current valid study permit and your co-op work permit if applicable**
- **Digital photo** ([photograph specifications](#))

You may also need:

- **Enrolment Verification Letter** – It is highly recommended for students who are already enrolled in the program to provide this document to prove the current enrolment status at the institution. If you require a Letter for Immigration and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) purposes, please refer to this [page](#).
- **Medical exam**: If you plan to work in jobs which require a medical exam, such as working with children or in healthcare settings, you must have taken a medical exam and have the right conditions on your co-op work permit before starting your co-op, field placement, internship, externship or practicum. Please click the [medical exam](#) to check if you need one.
- **Proof of financial support (only required if applying for study permit extension at the same time)**
 - Examples are:
 - proof of a Canadian bank account in your name if you've transferred money to Canada
 - Guaranteed Investment Certificate (GIC) from a participating Canadian financial institution
 - proof of a student or education loan from a bank
 - your bank statements for the past 4 months
 - a bank draft that can be converted to Canadian dollars
 - proof you paid tuition and housing fees
- **Other documents** – if requested by IRCC during the process of your application.

STEP 1

- Log in/ Sign up to your [IRCC account](#)

We recommend using Option 1: GCKey
(Sign in with your GCKey user ID and password)

- Scroll down to start an application and click on '**Apply to come to Canada**', as seen below

STEP 3

You will be guided through the following steps to complete your application:

1. Upload your documents
2. Review your application
3. Submit your application

After you have started your application, your information will be saved for **60 days**. Whenever you log in back to your GCKey account, your application will be listed and looks like below. You can always go back, click “**Continue application**” to edit, then submit the application when you’re ready.

After you submit your application, you will see a page that confirms that your application has been submitted. It will have more information on the next steps. Shortly after you submit, you will also receive a confirmation message in your account. You might consider downloading the Letter of Submission as proof that your co-op work permit has been submitted.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How long may it take to have your work permit application processed?

Can I start the co-op work if I have submitted the co-op work permit application and I am waiting for it to be processed?

Students who are already in Canada and have applied for a co-op work permit may begin their co-op placement using their [on campus](#) and [off campus](#) work authorization, provided they meet all the eligibility requirements.

There is no limit on work hours for on-campus work. A student may accept employment on the campus of the university or college at which they are a full-time student.

For off-campus work authorization, students can work a total of 20 hours per week during an academic term or semester while they are waiting for their co-op work permit; however, **the 20 hours must include both the hours worked at their co-op job and those worked at their regular paid job (if they have one)**.

If the co-op work permit application is refused, they must stop their co-op work immediately.

If I transferred from another institution and my co-op work permit has another institution's information, can I start the co-op with this co-op work permit?

As co-op work permit is institution-specific, and only valid for the work approved by the institution printed on your document, you need to apply for a new co-op work permit with Seneca program information and relevant documents.

What if my study permit expires during my work placement?

- As a student, it is mandatory that you maintain your status in Canada, therefore you must extend your study permit and request a co-op work permit at that the same time
- If IRCC receives your application before your current document expires you are in “maintained status” which allows you to continue studying until a decision has been made

How many hours can I work in a co-op per week?

Under a co-op work permit, there is no limit to the number of hours you can work on co-op terms as per IRCC's requirement. Please be advised that co-op is part of your academic curriculum, and all the

specific employment details need to be pre-approved by your WIL coordinator or program coordinator. They may have specific requirements as to the hours for your co-op work.

When can I start working?

Before you begin co-op work, you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You have a valid study permit and a valid co-op work permit, or you have applied to extend both your study permit and co-op work permit before they expired and have maintained status, or you have a valid study permit and are eligible to work while you are waiting for your co-op work permit.
- For students who need to work in one of the fields when an immigration [medical exam](#) is required, you have a work permit with conditions allowing you to work in the related jobs.
- You have a valid Social Insurance Number, or you had a SIN and are on maintained status.
- You are enrolled in a work-integrated learning course or semester.
- Your co-op work term has begun.

When must I stop working?

You must stop working immediately if you no longer meet the above requirements. For example, do not work if your study permit and co-op work permit expire and you did not apply to extend it.

Furthermore, you cannot use your co-op work permit for any employment other than a co-op, internship or field placement required for your program. You **cannot continue** using your co-op work permit **after the end** of your co-op, internship, or field placement, even if it is still valid.

Can I work on/off campus during my co-op semester?

Co-op work permits are separate from the eligibility to work [on campus](#) and [off campus](#) and can only be used for work required for your program.

You may work on a co-op work permit during your co-op term and also work on and/or off campus in addition to your co-op position at the same time if you meet the criteria for each.
