SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR AVOIDING RENTAL SCAMS

- Check the list thoroughly. Often scammers operate out of foreign countries, claiming to be landlords that are temporarily living outside of North America. Their emails are often full of spelling errors and they request a deposit before the potential tenant has had a chance to preview the rental property.
- **Never wire funds** to anyone claiming to be a landlord currently living in a foreign country. Never send money back when requested.
- Never give out personal financial information
- **Trust your instincts.** If something seems strange, do not rent from the provider and discontinue further correspondence.
- Be cautious when detailed information is provided without requesting it
- Always fill out a Landlord Rental Agreement
