
Program Overview:



Potential Career Pathways:

This program provides you with the knowledge in a variety of Project Management methodologies (traditional waterfall, incremental, iterative, agile) that are currently being practiced in the IT industry. You'll gain a solid understanding of which methodology is most appropriate to use for any given Information Technology project. As a graduate of the Project Management - IT program, you'll work in a variety of positions related to the management of IT projects, such as:

- · Assistant Project Manager
- Analyst
- Project Coordinator
- Project Manager

Optional Co-op:

Students meeting all academic requirements may have the opportunity to complete an optional co-op work term(s) in a formal work environment. In most cases, the work term(s) is a full-time paid position completed between two academic semesters. In programs with limited co-op opportunities, additional academic requirements and a passing grade on a communication assessment may be required for eligibility. Eligibility for participation does not guarantee a work position will be secured. Additional fees are required for those participating in the optional co-op stream regardless of success in securing a work position.

- Successful completion of all first and second-semester required courses (including COM101/COM111 and Liberals/General Education) in the semester you apply for WIL as stated in the most current full-time course calendar
- Must be enrolled in a minimum of four courses
- A minimum semester GPA of 3.0 (five or more courses) in the application semester

- · A minimum semester GPA of 3.2 (four courses) in the application semester
- A minimum overall GPA of 3.0
- Once admitted into the WIL stream, students are required to take at least four courses in their subsequent academic semesters and maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0

When to apply?

Semesters 2, 3, and 4 (Winter, Summer, Fall)

NOTE: Once you have completed two co-op placements, you cannot graduate from the CSN program or transfer back into the CSN program. You must remain in the CTY program to graduate.

Admissions Requirements for Future Students/Students Graduating Secondary School:

- Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD), or equivalent, or a mature applicant
- English: Grade 12 C or U, or equivalent course
- Mathematics: Grade 12 C or U, or Grade 11 U or M, or equivalent course

Canadian citizens and permanent residents may satisfy the English and/or mathematics requirements for this program through successful **Seneca pre-admission testing**.

Recommended upgrading for applicants who do not meet academic subject requirements.
